*Studies in the History of Ideas in the Low Countries* intends to present research on the history of philosophy and intellectual history in the Netherlands from an interdisciplinary point of view, promoting the contextual approach in the historiography of ideas. The Dutch intellectual climate, ever since the Golden Age and even before, contributed to the international exchange and to the integration of new approaches and concepts presented in the world of learning.

*Studies in the History of Ideas in the Low Countries* will focus on books aiming at the documentation and analysis of philosophical and other developments in Dutch intellectual history that have both a contextual and an international aspect. The first volume, concerning Franco Burgersdijk is a case in point. It presents the different aspects of the philosophical doctrines of this proponent of Aristotelianism, its Dutch background and international ramifications. To answer the question why this Leiden professor deployed this extensive and highly successful (as measured from the many reprints till far in the eighteenth century) scholarly work, requires a contextual presentation of the several elements of his philosophical opus. The second volume is on the *Notae in programma quoddam ou Remarques sur l'Esprit Humain* (1648) by René Descartes. It discusses the context of this explication of Cartesian philosophy in its confrontation with Dutch philosophical interests.

The volumes in the series will be either in English or in French, depending on the scholarly audience addressed. None will be done in more than one language at the time, except for bi-lingual text-editions.
